From Our Rabbi

May has always been my favorite month. There's a high probability my bias derives from May being my birthday month. Still, the natural events of spring come to their fullness during May. It warms up, without the stifling heat we'll get during the summer. The palette of flowers moves beyond forsythia yellow and azalea purple. The leaves return to the trees. Snow fall is inconsequential, with an Albany average of 0.1 inch for the month (the record from 1945 is 5.4 inches).

Another reason I like May is for its sense of culmination. Academic years are coming to an end, and the programmatic year of the synagogue winds down. The joy – sometimes relief – at completion is coupled with the eager anticipation of plans made for the time ahead.

The Jewish calendar brings good things, too. **Yom HaAtzma'ut**, celebrating the establishment of the State of Israel, and **Yom Yerushalayim**, commemorating the return to Jewish sovereignty of the ancient city of Jerusalem, both occur in May. Frequently, as in this year, the festival of **Shavuot** occurs in May, and we will celebrate it on Tuesday, May 30, at 7:30 PM.

A highlight of Shavuot this year will be the **Confirmation** ceremony. B'nai Sholom's liberal requirements for Confirmation, which allow for completion of a course of study at the student's own pace via Mifgash, our communal High School program, will bring together 5 of our young people for the ceremony. Noah Degroult-Elias, Asher Novkov-Bloom, Shira Novkov-Bloom, Ben Rethemeyer, and Hugh Smith are our confirmands who will conduct the service, read from the Torah, and speak about the Jewish influences on their lives.

A very different type of event which happens in May, to which all congregants are invited is the **Reform Jewish Voice of New York State Advocacy Day** at the state capitol. Social justice advocates from Reform synagogues throughout New York converge on Albany first to get fired up before heading to the Capitol and the LOB to speak to elected officials, or their legislative aides. Register at <http://rjvnys.org/>, selecting the link underneath my picture. This year focus will be on legislation affecting reproductive rights, public education funding, voting rights, and electoral reform. The RJV staff in Washington will set up appointments for us with our legislators, and there's a better chance if you register by May 1. Our legislators love hearing from the liberal religious denominations; if you are not from the immediate vicinity of B'nai Sholom, your voice might go farther! With things changing in Washington, our state houses become an even more important locus for achieving our goals.

Finally, May is planting season. I could have put in peas, lettuce, cabbage, radishes, and spinach in during April, but I always feel the need to wait till after Passover, at which time the tomatoes can go in. Once the tomatoes are in, the peppers can go in. If you have never raised your own food, I urge you to try. It's a profoundly rewarding endeavor, one that I find brings me closer to the Creator and the intricacies of creation.

Who Me? An advocate? Can I really do that? Yes! Should I? YES!

The passion for social justice is reflected in the ancient words of our prophets and sages and in the declarations of our Movement's leaders throughout its history. The ancient command "Tzedek, Tzedek Tirdof! Justice, justice shall you seek!" constantly reverberates in our ears. It has become deeply embedded in the Reform Jewish psyche. This charge has led to a long and proud tradition of political activism by the Reform Movement.¹ And it is the focus of our Social Action Committee's (SAC's) efforts for the coming year.

Due to the demands of publishing deadlines, this article is being written before our Social Action Shabbat service (April 28) where a speaker from the New York Civil Liberties Union (NYCLU – a branch of the ACLU) taught us about the mechanics of advocacy (how, when, where, etc.). Excerpts from his talk will be in next month's bulletin. But the first step to becoming an advocate is to become informed.

Joining B'nai Sholom (or any Reform congregation) does not mean one subscribes to a particular political perspective. Yet, our diversity need not deter us from fulfilling our prophetic mandate. Reaching well-reasoned positions informed by current information and our Reform Jewish values allows us to speak truth to power in pursuit of justice. That is the goal of the SAC programming for the year – to give us all the knowledge needed to be an effective advocate for justice this year and beyond.

So, to kick off that effort, here are some great resources to become informed on many of the social justice issues of the day. There are many other resources – the Social Action Committee will try to highlight various issues throughout the coming year in articles and activities to empower you to take action individually or with a group.

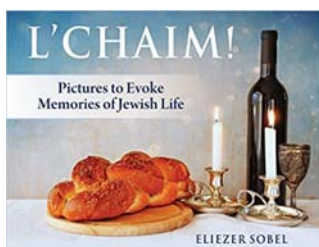
Changes in Board of Trustees

Pictures to Evoke Memories of Jewish Life



In spending time with his mother in the advanced stages of Alzheimer's disease, author Eliezer Sobel recognized something astounding: Although she had seemingly lost all of her language skills several years earlier, she still enjoyed gazing at pictures in magazines, and she actually read the headlines aloud! He searched for a simple picture book with easy-to-read captions in big print, but learned that while there are over twenty thousand books designed for caregivers, there are virtually no books written for patients with dementia.

L'Chaim: Pictures to Evoke Memories of Jewish Life was created specifically for Jewish elders who suffer from some form of memory loss. Pictures and captions stimulate the recollection of past events and provide tender moments of connection between caregivers and loved ones.

Of course, we hope you never need a book like this.

YOBS Creative Service

This year's YOBS Creative Service on Friday, March 24 was a major success. We made it holiday themed. We went through all of the Jewish holidays and all of the prayers in our service and found that they aligned perfectly. Before each prayer, a YOBSer explained to the congregation how the next holiday in line matched up with the succeeding prayer. After going through a prayer, we then taped the name of the prayer and the name of the holiday onto the arc. This showed everyone the sequence of both the holidays in the year and prayers in the Shabbat service. However, the main highlight of the night was the music by Max Suib and Ben Klamka. These two virtuosos lead us in YOBS' favorite song, "Shofar Blast", as both the opening and closing songs. This represented the cycle starting with Rosh Hashanah and going through all of the holidays, repeating the cycle again. During the prayers, Max, with his guitar, introduced the congregation to some camp tunes and Ben was able to play some B'nai Sholom "classics" on the piano. The creativity and musicality of YOBS made the service very original, interesting, and at times, entertaining. It was certainly a night to remember.

Chocolate Seder

The annual YOBS Chocolate Seder on April 2 was as delicious as ever. We were able to find different candies and chocolates that represented everything one might have on the family seder table. The whole seder was anyone's dessert dream, and at the same time, it was educational. Like any other seder, we went through the story of Passover and learned about it, but we also discussed different Passover traditions practiced all around the world. In addition to eating sweets, we wore masks to represent the ten plagues and engaged in a fiercely competitive afikoman hunt. The Chocolate Seder provided a great way for families to spend time together. Additionally, it gave YOBS a chance to engage more with younger children, and it definitely served as a fun event for people of all ages.

Assemblywoman Nily Rozic Comes To B'nai Sholom

On Monday night, April 3, B'nai Sholom hosted Nily Rozic who talked to us about being the youngest woman ever elected to the New York State Assembly as well as being a Sabbath observant Jew. Nily detailed her fascinating biography being born in Jerusalem to Argentinian parents who made aliyah, moving to Queens as a young girl and inspired by a high school teacher became involved in politics and at 27 was elected to the Assembly. She also pointed out that her first name is an acronym of a biblical phrase (Netzakh Yisrael Lo Yishaker — The Eternity (God) of Israel will not lie: I Samuel 15:29), and was the name of a Jewish espionage network in Palestine during World War I. Nily shared insights of her time in the legislature and the challenges being female, progressive and a Latina Jew committed to Israel, all while representing a Queens district that is 50% Asian-American. Those attending certainly received a lesson in civics from a unique perspective.
