From our Rabbi...

THE HOLIDAYS ARE OVER! After Rosh Hashanah, Tashlikh, Shabbat Shuvah, Yom Kippur, seven days of Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, and Simhat Torah, which were preceded by the penitential moments of Elul, including Selichot, which were preceded by two months of service preparation, lining up lay readers and chanters, and sermon-writing, the holidays are over.

So now it's time to think about next year's holidays, because Rosh Hashanah begins Wednesday night, September 20.

One big thing that we're talking about for next year is the new Reform prayer book for the Days of Awe *Mishkan HaNefesh*, now two years old. Several members of our Ritual Committee have read the book, and in November and possibly December we're going to look at it in some detail as a group, most likely focusing on major changes, and the possibilities offered. I've asked the Ritual Committee to present its recommendation to the Board of Trustees by January. The Committee may recommend adoption, or further study, or maintaining the status quo. From preliminary informal talks, it seems likely we will move ahead in some manner.

When we moved in 1986 from *Union Prayer Book II, Newly Revised* (© 1945) to *Mishkan Tefillah/Gates of Prayer* (© 1978), we had a wonderful and devoted Ad Hoc Committee chaired by Vera Propp, of blessed memory, that studied the proposed new book in great detail. Since those days 30 years ago, B'nai Sholom has grown significantly in its devotion to learning. Therefore, I am planning a winter course around this new mahzor for the Days of Awe, and am encouraging those interested in the possibility of a new book to join this study process.

Some mechanism will need to be decided upon for the study process to share its thoughts with our Board, which would decide whether we shall adopt the new book. I believe that if we are to go ahead with a Fall 2017 start, the decision to adopt must be made by May 2017 so that ample time is available to do what needs to be done: choosing the readings, marking the cues, delineating parts for other participants, creating new spreadsheets, making copies for the participants, and so forth. Separate from those tasks would be the task of fundraising for the new books. Our new books have always come from special campaigns, and the generosity of our congregants over the years has been exemplary.

Now that Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are over, I hope to preserve their moods by delving into the new liturgy, along with other literature the Central Conference of American Rabbis has made available in connection with these books.

Who needs Hanukkah, when I hope to carry Yom Kippur in my heart until March!

B'nai Sholom's market will be held at the synagogue, 420 Whitehall Road, Albany, on Sunday, November 13 from 10am to 4pm.

Exquisite fair trade items from all over the world including jewelry, textiles for the home, baskets, clothes, handbags, purses, scarves, children's products, and more, PLUS coffee, tea and chocolate will be offered by Mayan Hands, Mango Tree Imports, Women's Peace Collection, Amani ya Juu, Freeset, Dean's Beans and Equal Exchange.

So what does "fair trade" mean? When you buy fair trade goods, you are buying products from producers in developing countries at a fair price. It is a more efficient way of promoting sustainable development than traditional charity and aid. Buyers have the ability to make a difference in the lives of the producers, who often cannot find employment in the countries where they live. Fair trade coffee, tea and chocolate are grown and produced sustainably; good for you and good for the planet!

Savvy consumers are looking for unique, high quality products and the producers, bearers of a distinct culture, express their ethnic identity through their handcrafted products. By purchasing handmade items we bring the world into our everyday lives.

Moreover, all the items offered at the sale benefits the producers. Paying a fair return for their products, and creating long-term relationships, fair trade businesses empower artisans to care for themselves and their families, so that they and their communities can thrive. As we know, many mainstream businesses rely on cheap sources of labor to achieve high profit margins, while the people who work in their factories or on their farms make barely enough to survive.

Let's think about this for a moment: "What if everything we wore, we ate, and absolutely everything we bought empowered someone to better their lives and the lives of those in their community? Imagine what that world could look like---a world in which everyone had the opportunity to live with purpose and dignity! That world is within our reach. Let's work towards it." Surprise Lake Camp - Rose Pass

This year supplied another incredible summer of memories, laughs, and good times at Camp Eisner.

This summer, I participated in various activities such as different sports, arts, and programs organized by the staff. Some of my favorite sports included tennis and ultimate Frisbee. I also helped write and act in the Olim show that the oldest unit makes every year. This is different than the other units since we are the only group allowed to write our own play.

Most nights, some of the Olim staff members would organize an evening program for us which was different every night. The best evening activities were the ones where we could just relax and hang out with each other. Some nights, we would have a "camp-wide event" where they would plan something for the entire camp to participate in. For example, every year we have rib night which is a special dinner.

One of my favorite things about Eisner is Friday night Shabbat. Everyone dresses up in white for an all-camp dinner followed by T'fillah. After we finish praying we head into the Bait Am for song session. This is where we join together and intensely sing popular songs on camp. As Olim we go especially crazy during song session since it's our last year to really enjoy it. After all the jumping up and down at song session, we rush onto the Quad for Israeli dancing. This too is extremely fun. Many of the Olim boys also wear skirts that were passed down by past Olim campers—which has been a tradition for many years. By the time we are done, everyone is exhausted and ready to head back to their bunk, bringing an end to an always amazing night at Eisner.

My experience at Eisner has been so enriching to both my Jewish and social lives which is what made it so worthwhile. I look forward to sharing many more memories with some of my closest friends next summer during the Israel trip.

Crane Lake Camp - Full Summer- by Victoria Smith

This year, I spent my 6th summer at Crane Lake Camp where I learned Jewish values, opened myself up to the Jewish community, and made stronger friendships. With a summer full of being with some of my closest friends; learning Jewish values at Keshet. (Keshet are the electives taught by the faculty—the rabbis, cantors, and educators who spend a week or two with us at camp and help to make Judaism come alive for campers.) I was bound to have a great summer of learning and friendships.

Once per session, my unit, Upper Chaverim (“friends”) was able to lead services, either reading Torah or leading in prayers. I had opportunities to do community service, and always help others, such as the younger campers or taking care of the animals. Every week we had a value of the week. With *kavanah*, meaning intention, or *ruach*, meaning spirit, we would keep those values in mind and apply them to our activities and daily lives.

During 1st session we took a trip to NYC and enjoyed watching Fiddler on the Roof on Broadway. We also got to tour Temple Emanu-El (the largest house of Jewish worship in the world) and sleep at Temple Israel of NYC. To fully enjoy the NYC experience, our counselors brought in pizza at 11:00 p.m. (it is the city that never sleeps), and genuine NYC bagels in the morning. During 2nd session we took a day trip to Zoar Outdoor Park to go white water rafting.

The summer of 2017 will be my last year as a camper, and I will be in Olim, the unit of leaders. I will be a role model at services, and be a captain during color war. The following year I will have the opportunity to travel to Israel with my fellow campers, but in 2017 I will be saying goodbye to some of the people who won't be going on the Israel trip. I am planning to make my last summer at Crane Lake the best yet!


New in the library –

The Aleppo Codex:

A True Story of Obsession, Faith and the Pursuit of an Ancient Bible

by Matti Friedman,

Algonquin Books, 2012



Jonathan Safran Foer wrote this blurb about *The Aleppo Codex*. “This great book comes closer to containing everything than any book I’ve read in a long, long time.” It sounds over-the-top. Here, however, is a partial list of the people and events included in this almost unbelievable true story: Abraham, the First Crusade, Maimonides, the UN Partition Plan for Palestine vote in 1947, Yitzhak Ben-Zvi (President of Israel from 1952-1963), the Ben-Zvi Institute, MOSSAD agents, rabbis, and Syrian Jewish communities in Aleppo, Israel and New York. (Even Albany plays a small role, as fluorescence tests were performed on the Codex at a lab here.) The codex itself is the earliest known manuscript of the complete text of the Bible and was copied by the scribe Shlomo Ben-Bya’a more than 1000 years ago. It has been ransomed, protected, burned, smuggled, stolen and neglected. Its ownership was litigated in an Israeli rabbinic court, and someone may even have been murdered. So, OK, it’s not *everything*, but it’s enough to highly recommend this engaging and informative book.

Note: The B’nai Sholom Library only has the book, but if you’d like to listen to it instead, copies of the audio are available through your local library. Simon Vance does an excellent job of reading.
