*From our Rabbi...*

When I was a young and impressionable teenager, an older teenager who I looked up to as a teacher opined, in a presentation, that there were too many Jewish holidays. All these holidays, he said, got in the way of the every-day business of being a Jew. I kept this in my mind for several years, until I happened to mention it to this mentor. "Oh, I don't think that anymore. I welcome every opportunity to celebrate."

After our fall holiday season, it may seem like there are too many Jewish holidays, and that they are all crammed into a three-and-a-half-week period. Beginning with Selihot and Rosh Hashanah, continuing with Yom Kippur, and finishing up with Sukkot and finally with Simhat Torah as a grand finale, we are constantly lighting candles, eating big meals, and deviating from our usual schedules.

Focusing on these 3 ½ weeks usually occupies 25% of my year; with the switch to the new prayer book for the Days of Awe, an even greater percentage of my time was devoting to our fall holiday season. I found this year's holidays greatly enhanced with *Mishkan haNefesh*, and I have only heard good comments from the congregation about the book.

Leaving the holiday season behind does give us the added time and opportunity to devote to the every-day business of being a Jew. *What is that "business"?*

We have evolved a Judaism that has many different touchstones. Consequently, one's daily Jewishness could center around any number of primary concerns. One might feel drawn to improving the world, or helping others in need, or study of sacred text, or prayer, or following the news about Israel. Dancing, singing, needle point, or watching dancing or plays or movies, or listen to music, or cook, or reading fiction call to others. You could help raise funds for a whole universe of good causes that need fundraising help, or you could help maintain their websites or social media presence. Your family's history is an important Jewish story that needs to be written down, and the photos need to be labeled while you still remember who they are. There's always another language to learn – Hebrew, Yiddish, Ladino, or maybe Judeo-Persian. Maybe you feel the call to travel. There's world of Jewish experience, thought, text, activity, places, and people out there over time and space. *What's your business?* Or perhaps: what can be your Jewish business? Is it people, history, books, places, actions?

I am looking forward to a few weeks before I have to think about Hanukkah. Can't wait to follow some Jewish passions before then. Hope you'll do the same.

# Shop at Our Second Fair Trade Vendor and Judaica Sale on November 12

On Sunday, November 12 from 10am - 3pm B'nai Sholom will be hosting its second Fair Trade Vendor and Judaica Sale. The day will feature vendors from the Capital Region selling a wide selection of fairly traded merchandise. We will also have our annual Judaica sale and sale of Equal Exchange (fairly traded) chocolate and coffee, and a bake sale.

The vendors are selling merchandise from countries from Africa, Central America and South America. That the merchandise is fair trade ensures that people are paid a fair wage for their crafts, honestly reflecting the costs inherent in making each product. The principles of fair trade also promote a safe work environment and an environmentally sensitive work environment.

The sale is the result of a joint effort between the Fundraising committee and Mayan Hands. Mayan Hands rents space at B'nai Sholom and it has been a privilege and a pleasure to get to know Brenda Rosenbaum and Anne Kelly from Mayan Hands. The Jewish World recently published an article about Brenda. Her story is a remarkable one. Brenda and her late husband Fredy lived in Guatemala and moved to Albany in 1980 escaping the violent civil war there. Brenda started as a student of anthropology in Guatemala and she continued her studies at the University at Albany, earning her degree in 1987. Before coming to the US, Brenda had lived and worked with Mayan women on and off through the years and witnessed the deep poverty and discrimination they suffer at the hands of the Guatemalan state. In 1990, Brenda and Fredy founded Mayan Hands as a way to help Mayan women earn a living wage. Mayan Hands has been selling beautiful, handcrafted, fairly traded products for more than 25 years, enabling its artisan partners to earn enough money to raise their families out of poverty.

Brenda has been a wonderful resource for the Fundraising committee in helping them to connect with other fair trade vendors and organize the sale. The Fundraising committee is busy now preparing for the sale on Sunday, November 12 and it's shaping up to be a wonderful day. Please plan on stopping by! There will be a lot to check out, from the fairly traded merchandise to Judaica, Equal Exchange products and our bake sale!

## December 8 Social Action Shabbat: Through Other's Eyes

I grew up in Hashomer Hatzair, a socialist-Zionist Jewish youth movement in Israel. Hashomer Hatzair has shaped my life long commitment to social justice and my belief in the need for a Jewish-Arab co-existence. When my wife Amy and I left our Kibbutz and moved to NY, I was happy to discover that Hashomer Hatzair had a youth summer camp, Camp Shomria, in Liberty NY that has been operating since the 1940's. This meant that my kids could be exposed to similar experiences and the values that I developed. Camp Shomria was where I first learned about the program "Through Other's Eyes".

This program, now in its 17<sup>th</sup> year, is a photography project that brings together and opens channels of communication between Jewish and Arab/Palestinian youth. The first part of the program begins in Israel, bringing together 16 year old Jewish and Arab youth who learn about each other through collaborative art projects that focuses mainly on photography. The program allows the participants to learn about each other's culture and history. It builds bridges and encourages peaceful co-existence. The second part of the project brings the group to Camp Shomria in Liberty, NY for a three week workshop.

For years I looked forward to meeting the Jewish and Arab youth group at the end of our kids' Summer Camp. Watching these young adults interacting with each other and presenting their projects, gave me hope that co-existence between Jews and Arabs may be possible one day. It is on the younger generation to break the barriers and lead the way.

Please join us on Friday, December 8 at 8 pm and learn about this important bridge building project. The program will be presented by Efrat Levy, a graduate of Camp Shomria and former board president.

## What's UP with the House Committee

If you look up while on our entrance walkway, you will notice the shiny new ceiling, or soffit, as it is known in the business, which was installed by our contractor just prior to Rosh Hashanah. In conjunction with that installation, we completed the long-running conversion of the soffit lights to standard fixtures to enable use of conventional bulbs rather than the specialty CFL bulbs. This means that there are no ballast transformers to burn out, which had happened over time to 7 of the 11 fixtures, and that we don't have to order special rectangular-base CFL bulbs. The end result is that if and when a bulb burns out, we just screw in a new one, rather than endure a dead fixture for months at a time while we wait for new bulbs or for warm weather.

In other outdoor news, thanks to those who participated in Spring and Fall cleanup days by weeding, trimming, cutting down dead limbs and trees and assorted other activities:

One of House Committee's more glamorous activities was replacing the supply and drain plumbing for the utility sink in the custodial closet in the back of the social hall. Tours of the new installation are available upon request.

Moving in through the main doors into the Sanctuary, we are in the process of installing railings on the steps up to the bimah. This has become more of a concern as some of us can use a little support ascending to or descending from the bimah, particularly when passing between tables with lots of Hanukah candles performing their appointed tasks. We're doing our best to craft something in the style of the ark.

Also in the hopper is a project to install a permanent projector on the ceiling of the sanctuary, to enable more and better use of visual media without the issue of setting up a temporary projector mounting in the seating area. That will also entail rewiring the ceiling speakers and relocating the bookshelf with the electronic equipment.

The House Committee is Phil Teumim and Mitch Levin, with ad hoc assistance from Eric Goldberg, Stuart Schwartz, Christine Blackman, and various other folks.
