### *"The Kabbalah of Bob Dylan"*

*A presentation by Seth Rogovoy*

B'nai Sholom is hosting a very special night with the first half featuring **Seth Rogovoy**, termed "American Jewry's greatest Dylan scholar" who will present a multimedia program exploring the Jewish influences in the life and work of the recent Nobel Prize-winner. With the aid of audio clips, video, still images, and textual comparisons, Rogovoy, author of "**Bob Dylan: Prophet Mystic Poet**" (Scribner 2009), will illustrate how Dylan's songwriting has always been profoundly rooted in Jewish writings, including the Torah, the Prophets, the Talmud, and mysticism, fusing these inspirations into a genre of "rock 'n' roll midrash."

And get ready for this -- after the break we will be treated to a selection of Dylan's Jewish influenced songs referenced in the Rogovoy presentation by resident B'nai Sholom folkies Phil Teumim and Rabbi Don Cashman and perhaps a surprise guest or two.

## From the Social Action Committee

Throughout Jewish tradition, the God of Israel is described again and again as One who loves the immigrant. Surely, Jewish history informs the need for an involved Jewish response to the issue of immigration to this country. On a more secular level, we know that the 787,580 young people who have been granted approval under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) federal program created in 2012 which allows people brought to the US illegally as children the temporary right to live, study and work legally in America, are contributors who bring great benefit to society.

Known as the *dreamers*, these individuals are vetted for criminal history or threat to national security, and must be students or have completed school or military service. If they pass vetting, action to deport them is deferred for two years, with a chance to renew. They are eligible for basics like a drivers' license, college enrollment, or a work permit. To apply, they must have been younger than 31 on June 15, 2012 when the program began, and, "undocumented", lacking legal immigration status. They must have arrived in the US before turning 16 and lived here continuously since June 2007.

If the repeal of DACA is successful, the Center for American Progress estimates that over the next ten years, the US Gross Domestic Product (GDP) will be reduced by 433.4 billion dollars. In New York State alone, the annual GDP would be reduced by \$2,379,146,866. The 1.3 million young undocumented immigrants enrolled or immediately eligible for DACA contribute an estimated 2 billion dollars a year in state and local taxes. This includes personal income, property, and sales and excise taxes. *Dreamers* also pay federal taxes including Social Security and Medicare while most will not be able to claim these benefits. *Dreamers* are not eligible for federal education aid or participation in Obamacare (ACA).

We must remember the timeless rabbinic teaching: "Do not judge your fellow until you stand in their place" (*Pirkei Avot 2:4*). We must not attack undocumented residents with the harmful, hateful rhetoric that many use today as they are stuck in a challenging predicament that few can relate to. In their stead, the rabbis even promoted immigration: "He who has not made good in one place and fails to move and try their luck in some other place has only himself to complain about" (BT *Bava Metzia 75b*). One cannot remain stuck in an underprivileged region if it is a clear stumbling block to oneself and one's family to achieve their best selves.

In the Torah, there is a positive commandment to love the foreigner in our midst (Deuteronomy 10:18), and a negative commandment against oppressing or perverting justice for them in any way (Exodus 22:20; Deuteronomy 24:17). The rabbis elaborated on this prohibition: "You shall not wrong or oppress the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt. You shall not wrong with words, and you shall not oppress financially" (*Mekhilta d'Rabbi Yishmael, Mishpatim*).

Thus, our responsibility to the vulnerable immigrant requires that we honor the image of God in all people. Perhaps Emmanuel Levinas, the French Talmudist and Jewish philosopher, said it best: "The respect for the stranger and the sanctification of the name of the Eternal are strangely equivalent" ("Toward the Other," *Nine Talmudic Readings* 27).

## In the library – Did you know?

The B'nai Sholom library does not use the Dewey decimal system. Rather, we have a color-coded system and each book has a dot on its spine. There is a sign with a list of the sections and what kinds of books they contain. The "blue" section of the library is for the Bible, other Jewish texts, and commentaries thereon. It is located on the right side of the longest wall of shelves. Most of the collection's best reference books are in this section. Whether you are preparing to give a D'var Torah, or just want some new insights for your Torah study, this is the place to come. As you browse, be sure to check out the Anchor Yale Bible series. For over 50 years, this publishing program has produced books devoted to the latest scholarship on the Bible and biblical topics. There are now over 100 volumes, of which B'nai Sholom owns a few. Rabbi Cashman says, "They are written for the intelligent, educated, curious layperson," and that "the breadth of knowledge demonstrated by the authors is simply amazing." They are easy to find, as all the dust jackets are a medium sky blue. Please note, however, that because they are reference works (and expensive) they do not circulate.
