## From Our Rabbi ...

As I've mentioned before, many of the familiar Jewish holidays have an agricultural connection and are tied to the climate and planting cycle in the land of Israel. Ergo, much of our holiday cycle seems out of sync to those of us living in New York – never mind those in the Southern hemisphere!

Tisha b'Av is a different type of holiday, though. This year, the 9<sup>th</sup> of the month of Av corresponded to July 27, but the season surrounding it is much longer. Tisha b'Av is connected to history, not ecology. In the three weeks leading up to it – beginning with the 17<sup>th</sup> of Tammuz, a fast marking the breaching of the walls of Jerusalem – we recall the destruction of the Temple. During the "Three Weeks" as they are commonly called, we are supposed to be in a state of mourning. After Tisha b'Av, we turn things around, with seven weeks of consolation, reading comforting passages from the prophet Isaiah.

So, for a full ten weeks, the Jewish calendar attempts to direct our emotions.

It can be hard to summon grief on cue, especially in the summer, as many of us plan vacations, barbecues, and time with family and friends. But I think it can be equally challenging to take comfort when directed as well, all the more so when we are surrounded by causes of extreme discomfort – from the passage of the judicial overhaul in Israel to rising incidents of antisemitism, to the current political climate in the US, to the *actual* climate. We have plenty to be concerned about and it can require active effort to follow the directive to comfort ourselves.

I think our tradition acknowledges this struggle best through numbers. We get three weeks to mourn, but a full seven weeks to recover. Isaiah, on God's behalf, repeats his words of comfort twice: *nachamu, nachamu ami* – take comfort, take comfort my people. And we can continue to seek the comfort of strength in numbers, whether by joining a group movement to advocate for positive change, or, in our individual times of grief, feeling the support of family and community.

Remember that your B'nai Sholom family is always here for you, and we look forward to seeing our numbers (i.e. all of *you*) on full display in September as we gather for the High Holy Days!

## From Our President...

During B'nai Sholom's Annual Meeting on June 15, congregants approved the budget and elected new officers and board members for 2023-2024. Thank you to all new and returning board members for stepping up: Josh Brody, Liz Davis, Howie Domfort, Julie Friedman, Gail Golderman, Lois Gordon, Laura Kaplan, Maegan Knauf, Julie Novkov, Martha Rozett, Hayden Schwartz, Phil Teumim and Shari Whiting!

Also during the meeting, I reported on the status of our congregational affairs. The by-laws require a *written* annual report, so I am recapping my oral presentation here. If you would like to see a longer version of this report, please contact the temple office.

Now that the COVID tsunami is finally subsiding, we are all starting to rise from the wreckage and resume our active lifestyles. At B'nai Sholom, last year's activities seem to fall into three separate categories: what's old is new (things we used to do but had to stop during COVID); same but different (things we used to do, but now we do them differently); and new/new (things we didn't do before, but now we are doing them).

#### WHAT'S OLD IS NEW

We're back to serving food at B'nai Sholom, including Rosh Hashanah luncheons, the Progressive Dinner, the Volunteer Dinner and Onegs. We are back to hosting musical events, including coffee houses and concerts. And we're back to in-person learning, including Synagogue Scholars, book discussions, and courses taught by Rabbi Weisbrot and visiting scholars.

#### SAME BUT DIFFERENT

With Social Action, we have some ongoing projects, some new projects and some new volunteers. We continued working on a three-year climate change initiative with RAC-NY, combating hunger and homelessness with a variety of community partners, increasing childhood literacy with "Books for Babies" and supporting voting rights with postcards to Georgia. We also hosted blood drives and clothing drives and participated in the annual Pride Parade.

Our collaborative religious school B'Yachad has a new structure and B'nai has some new roles. We transitioned from partnering with two synagogues to partnering with one. The B'Yachad board now consists of six members: three from B'nai Sholom and three from Ohav Shalom. The school has about 30 students altogether. Ohav hosted the classes (Wednesdays and Sundays) and B'nai hosted the Purim Celebration and a Shabbat Dinner (followed by a Kabbalat Service).

### **NEW, NEW**

We hosted a farewell luncheon for Rabbi Cashman in June and an installation ceremony for Rabbi Weisbrot in October. We also hosted a Family BBQ (which will be repeated on August 20), and we participated in a community-wide Chanukah on Jay event (with arts/crafts and a new brochure).

We launched a brand new website, after working with Addicott Web for more than a year. Our new website has a modern and professional look and is easy to navigate. Its bold and consistent design promotes our congregation as engaging, warm and vibrant.

We had some new activities, too. Our Inclusivity Collaborative (formerly known as Audacious Hospitality) conducted a review of our physical building, prepared a survey to assess everyone's sense of belonging, assembled a group of liaisons to work with committees and planned an Inclusivity Shabbat service on June 30.

And we have some new priorities. The visibility of our security activities has increased. We started using the "Power of Hello" when welcoming people, promoted the idea that security is everyone's responsibility and prepared to change security codes for entering the building and disabling the alarm system. [Note: these codes were changed on July 25. If you have a key and didn't receive the new codes, contact the Office Manager.]

There is also some financial news. We were awarded a \$50,000 grant from New York State for "Securing Communities Against Hate Crimes": \$10,000 was spent on blast-resistant window films, and \$40,000 will be spent on outdoor lighting for the driveway. [Note: After the Annual Meeting, we were awarded an additional \$50,000 grant for an access control system, door repairs and locks, and other safety amenities]. We also received almost \$40,000 in donations through the Anniversary Fundraising Appeal. This money will help support improvements to our audio/video capacity in the Sanctuary, a new heating, ventilation and air conditioning system, new flooring in the classroom wing, and driveway repairs. Finally, we purchased rights to 10 new burial plots at Elmwood Hill Cemetery.

What's new with building and grounds? We received a large donation of desks/chairs for staff, credenzas and a whiteboard. We completed some upgrades: painting, computer networking and interior lighting. We've been actively working on a large-scale de-cluttering project. We have a new oak tree dedicated as a memorial to our founders and a new fox family!

As far as people are concerned, we have eight new member units (that's 14 people). These new members received Shabbat goody bags, invitations to brunch at a member's house, and they were profiled in the Bulletin. Some new members have already helped plan events and advance our Social Action agenda. Others have already attended Tot Shabbat, benefit concerts and weddings. We've also had 11 resignations—some of these congregants moved, some changed their affiliations and some left for other reasons.

And finally in the new/new category...82 of our congregants tried something new. They donated time (also known as "Moments") by attending classes and events and by helping with various activities (including mailings, advocacy calls, holiday baskets and furniture installation).

If you would like to try something new, there are lots of opportunities here at B'nai Sholom. You can help with "once and done" tasks, or you can help with ongoing planning efforts, or both. Examples of new things to try include sponsoring an oneg, helping fix things in and around the building, operating the new audio/video equipment, advocating for causes, providing direct service to those in need, donating blood, volunteering at the Regional Food Bank, being an event-greeter, coordinating greeters for the upcoming High Holiday season, and more! Contact info for these and other projects is listed in the Annual Guide.

## Torah Services at B'nai Sholom: A Hidden Treasure

My introduction to regular services (versus Torah services) was on Friday evenings. The lighting of the candles signified the beginning of a holiday. I came to love the liturgy about light being changed into darkness and the whole idea of having reached the end of the week and then beginning a new week together. I enjoy our prayer book and the elements everyone brings to worship – congregants engaged in fellowship, the wonderful music, Rabbi Weisbrot leading us through worship and sharing her insights through her sermons, and the wonderful growing cadre of lay leadership who conduct our services when our Rabbi is away.

And then there's the treasure that's hidden no more. About once a month, Rabbi Weisbrot conducts a Torah service and it's often on a Saturday morning. In the morning, saying prayers and singing with the sunlight streaming through the windows is a lovely experience. And when the Torah is introduced, everyone who wants to can have a hand in carrying it, dressing and undressing it, chanting blessings and reading translations. Occasionally Torah services take place on Friday nights and the experience is equally magical. Instead of just reading passages *about* the Torah, we have it in our midst.

If you haven't had the chance to enjoy a Torah service, consider joining one. The schedule is included in the Weekly E-announcements.

## Our next Torah service is set for Friday, August 18, at 7 PM.

B'nai Sholom possess two *sifrei* Torah (Torah scrolls). Come. Get to know them, and appreciate the history they carry.

The above are just a few of the many familiar sayings found in Pirkei Avot, or Ethics of the Fathers, one of the best known and most cited of Jewish texts. Adult Ed is considering doing a monthly study of this book of six chapters, one per month, led by Rabbi Weisbrot. - •A 12-pack of yogurt that consumed a lot of space in the shopping bag sparsely filling a fridge shelf.
- •A local resident explaining Hannaford fills the fridge twice daily because it is always empty.
- •Making a mental note to bring reusable shopping bags and paper bowls the next time I fill the fridges.
