The Days of Awe are behind us once again, leading us right into Sukkot, which is known as *z'man simchateinu* – the time of our joy. We will celebrate the harvest season by dwelling or eating in the sukkah (feel free to bring some food and eat in the sukkah at B'nai Sholom, and, weather-permitting, let us know in advance if you'd like a table and chairs!).

At the end of Sukkot, we will have our next yizkor service on **Friday, October 6** at **7 pm**, before turning (somewhat literally) to our service for Shabbat + Simchat Torah – the joy of the Torah – at **7:30 pm**. We need your help to make it a festive evening: join us in singing, processing with the Torah, unrolling it around the room if we have enough hands available, and hearing both the end and beginning of the Torah chanted as we restart the annual reading cycle.

But speaking of joy and helping hands, THANK YOU to all who helped make the recent High Holy Days such a smooth, safe, beautiful, and meaningful experience – from landscaping and flower placement to outdoor lighting, food preparation to ritual planning, tech support to teaching. Our honorees (including shofar blowers), musicians, and choir were instrumental in bringing the services to life. Plus, there were numerous tasks going on behind the scenes: security/usher coordination; production of the Annual Guide, holiday announcements, and yizkor books (these should be available on 10/6 due to a printing glitch); setting up of the sanctuary, prayer books, and polishing the Torah silver; planning our children's programs; compiling the member/registration lists and fielding inquiries from guests; organizing Rosh Hashanah luncheons, onegs, and break-fast; practicing Torah chanting/lifting; building and decorating our sukkah, and much, much more.

Thank you also to our office manager, Christine Blackman, for seeing us so ably through this busy holiday season – and the last eight and a half years – before her retirement.

May this season of joy be the start of a bright new year!

Saturday, December 16, 7:30 PM - After an almost four-year hiatus, B'nai Sholom is returning to in-person screenings. Our first showing will be *Farewell Mr. Haffman* (France 2022) about a Jewish jeweler who, fearing the worst, arranges for his family to flee the city and offers his employee the chance to take over his store until the conflict subsides. But his own attempts to escape are thwarted, and Mr. Haffmann is forced to seek his assistant's protection, a risky proposition for both men. The film masterfully guides the viewer through the world of Vichy, France, where lives are irrevocably shaped by the twin scourges of war and the black market. Rich in moral complexity and empathy, this is grand, big-screen adult entertainment at its finest.

Synagogue Scholar Presentation Series

<u>January 12, 2024</u> (Friday night) – Annual book talk by Martha Rozett on Marthe Cohen's "Behind Enemy Lines: The True Story of a French Jewish Spy in Nazi Germany."

<u>February 25, 2024</u> (Sunday morning) – Mary Warrener will deliver a talk entitled "Cut Off: Shylock, Anti-Semitism, Value and Irony" in Shakespeare's "The Merchant of Venice."

THINKING ABOUT FOOD

On the morning of September 25, did you wake up hungry? I did.

Did prayer and reflection chase away the growling? If you answered "no," then perhaps you can better relate to what some of our neighbors who live literally walking distance from our synagogue experience on a daily basis.

Ask anyone who has shopped for and filled one of the *Free Food Fridges* how it felt when they met some of the residents who rushed over to take the food that was being placed into a refrigerator in Albany, and you will soon hear how humbling it is to meet and talk to folks who are hungry. Their hunger is not self-imposed; it is because they don't have food.

Thanks to the generosity of many of our congregants, we have been able to stock three refrigerators every other month. Your generosity provides fresh fruit, vegetables, dairy, bread, healthy kid-friendly snacks and sometimes even some cookies.

We ask you to consider making a donation to the *Free Food Fridges* fund.

Recently, we were on a weekend getaway and I was inches from buying a *tchotchke* when my husband said, "Why don't you write a check for the *Free Food Fridges* instead of purchasing that?" You know, he was right. I did just that. The donation will never need dusting!

Caring Community: Helping To Help Each Other

Christine Blackman, B'nai Sholom's Office Manager, Retires



Christine Blackman came to B'nai Sholom eight years ago in 2015. How could she have known then that our synagogue would experience two major searches; a pandemic that began in 2020 and has lingered into its third year; transitions from Rabbi Cashman to interim Rabbi Katz to Rabbi Weisbrot? Christine worked with five different presidents, and as with the rabbis, each president had her own very different style. During all these transitions, Christine became a keeper of institutional knowledge in her role as office manager.

Although she is not Jewish, Christine learned about our traditions and took great pleasure in doing so. She was often alone in the office, where she became an expert at troubleshooting in every way imaginable. She has been

observed moving furniture, cleaning the kitchen, fixing stubborn machines and tactfully handling unlikely requests and inquiries. Among the challenges Christine helped to manage were a major reorganization of our space, including her office; lots of new technology; increases in security procedures and policies; and the shift to remote and hybrid services and other events. Her organizational skills, attention to detail, problem-solving ability and willingness to take initiative are only a few of the qualities that kept us running smoothly.

We'll remember Christine with her mask on an elegant chain around her neck, ready to put it on at a moment's notice; her quick smile and friendly voice; and her expressions of gratitude (and often treats) for volunteer office helpers. Mostly, we'll remember Christine's kindness to all of us, and we'll miss her in the months and years to come.

Spotlight on New Members: Daniel King

Daniel was born in Albany, where he spent the first few years of his life before his family moved to East Greenbush, spending his school years there. With the exception of a four-year stretch in the mid-2000s during which he lived in New York City, he has lived in this area all his life.

Daniel is a full-time historian and a career educator. His graduate thesis is on long-term peace prospects in Northern Ireland following the signing of the Belfast Agreement ("Good Friday Agreement"). Daniel began his career in education as a history teacher in the NYC public school system before moving back upstate and teaching history in the Hudson Valley. For the

past 10 years, he has worked for the New York State Education Department as a project manager for the ongoing development of the Regents Exam in Global History & Geography II

His hobbies include studying languages (currently studying Hebrew, Yiddish, Arabic, Spanish and French), reading, writing, video games and as much travel as he can afford.

When asked what attracted him to B'nai Sholom, Daniel mentioned he was instantly struck by how warm and inviting B'nai Sholom's congregation and Rabbi Weisbrot are — a sentiment he said he has heard echoed by other people who've visited the congregation.

His goals are to expand the breadth and depth of his knowledge of Judaism and Torah, and he plans in time on reading every book in the B'nai Sholom library.

Daniel added, "What is more important is that I try to contribute to our community. I have already trained with Community Security Services (CSS) and I would like to volunteer for the Safety & Security Team, perhaps also the Ritual Team, and otherwise help out wherever help is most needed."

Lastly, when asked if there was anything else he wanted people to know about him, Daniel noted:

"I am so bad at golf, a PGA pro told me I was 'unteachably bad' and I was later banned from a local driving range because every other ball I hit went over my own shoulder into the parking lot."
