From Our Rabbi...

As the daylight hours begin to shrink at this time of year, I have a little trick I like to use: just when the darkness starts encroaching a little too much for comfort, I start counting. I calculate the number of days until the winter solstice – when I know the darkness will be at its peak – and then remind myself that that date also marks a turning point. From that time on, it will start getting brighter. If, let's say, there are three weeks to the solstice, then in six weeks, we'll be back to this amount of daylight; and after that, every day promises more and more light.

While this trick works well in circumstances like the earth's orbit, I'll admit it can be harder to employ when the darkness is less predictable. If only we had a calendar that let us know when all the hostages would be returned; when the Israel/Gaza war and its devastating effects would end; when the recent spike in antisemitic and anti-Muslim threats and violence would once again begin to ebb.

Chanukah reminds us, though, that the sun isn't our only source of light. We can be God's partners in bringing more light to the world – through candles and prayer; by supporting each other in our moments of despair; by speaking up or out to advocate for justice and compassion; by living our daily lives with courage; and by gathering in community, where we can share the light of each other's faces.

May the candles of our *chanukiyot* (Chanukah menorahs) be a sign of greater light to come, *bimheirah b'yameinu* – speedily, in our days.

The Movies Return

'Farewell Mister Haffmann' Admission -- \$5

Saturday, December 16 7:30 p.m.

After an almost four-year hiatus, B'nai Sholom is returning to in-person screenings. Our first showing will be "**Farewell Mister Haffmann**" (France 2022) about a Jewish jeweler who, fearing the worst, arranges for his family to flee the city and offers his employee the chance to take over his store until the conflict subsides. But his own attempts to escape are thwarted, and Haffmann is forced to seek his assistant's protection, a risky proposition for both men.

The film masterfully guides the viewer through the world of Vichy, France, where lives are irrevocably shaped by the twin scourges of war and the black market. Rich in moral complexity and empathy, this is grand, big-screen adult entertainment at its finest.

Annual Book Talk – January 12, 2024 "Behind Enemy Lines: The True Story of a French Jewish Spy in Nazi Germany" by Marthe Cohn with Wendy Holden

For 18 years, congregant Martha Rozett has presented a book talk each winter at B'nai Sholom on a book of interest to our congregation and the larger Jewish community. At first, the talks were scheduled on Sunday afternoons, but in recent years (except for the 2021 pandemic year) they have taken place during or just after a shortened Friday night service. The title is announced a couple of months in advance so people can locate and read the book, and the talks generate lively discussions.

Martha's 19th book talk is scheduled for January 12, 2024. Over the years, friends have suggested titles, and this year Roy Fruiterman introduced her to Marthe Cohn's "**Behind Enemy Lines: The True Story of a French Jewish Spy in Nazi Germany**," published in 2002 and still in print. Cohn, a remarkable and courageous young French woman fluent in French and German, served as a spy for the French First Army in the final year of World War II. Slipping behind enemy lines disguised as a young German nurse seeking information about a fictional German fiancé, she gathered information from sympathetic or unwitting Germans and then rode her bicycle back across the border to report on troop movements to the French intelligence service.

Today, Cohn is an astounding 103 years old and the subject of a delightful 90-minute 2019 documentary called "Chichinette: The Accidental Spy." "Chichinette" ("little pain in the neck") was the nickname the French Army intelligence gave to their small, persistent, lively colleague.

You can find the documentary online and the book is available as an e-book at the Albany Public Library and used and new in paperback (we will order a copy for the B'nai Sholom library and have asked Book House to order a couple of copies.) The title "Behind Enemy Lines" is a popular one, so be sure to search for the book written by Marthe Cohn with Wendy Holden.

New Members Welcomed at Dinner and Service

On November 3, B'nai Sholom celebrated New Member Shabbat with a special dinner and service. Because COVID had prevented us from holding such an event for several years, we used the occasion to welcome and bless all those new members who have joined the congregation since the fall of 2021. In coming years, we plan to make New Member Shabbat an annual event, generally scheduled on the first Shabbat in November.

The Social Hall was filled that evening with congregants enjoying a dinner of catered entrees and pot-luck sides furnished by the more longstanding members. After dinner, participants engaged in a congregant "scavenger hunt" as a fun way for all members to get to know each other better.

At the erev Shabbat service, Rabbi Weisbrot likened B'nai Sholom to a wedding chuppah and to the tent of Abraham and Sarah, both open on all sides as a gesture of welcome to the community. She called all new members to the bimah for a short ceremony of welcome, which concluded with the Priestly Blessing. Many congregants lingered at the oneg after the service to enjoy delicious treats and to continue conversations begun earlier in the evening.
